Corvette WEC Racing in Belgium

It's Hard to Win when Luck and Mother Nature Are Against You

Misfortune and Mother Nature worked against Corvette Racing on May 7 as an early-race advantage turned into a fourth-place class finish for our dearly beloved No. 64 Corvette C8.R at the Six Hours of Spa.

Tommy Milner and Nick Tandy had hopes for a great race since they had done so well in the timing trials. Unfortunately, they finished a lap down in the FIA World Endurance Championship's GTE Pro class.

The race was a disjointed one, to say the least, with a mix of 11 full-course yellow or safety-car periods, plus three red-flag stoppages. All totaled, there were less than three hours of green-flag time in the race.

Tandy started third in class and was in a position to gain track position and potentially the lead by going a lap longer than the rest of the GTE Pro field before his first stop for fuel and tires. An untimely safety-car period for a heavy prototype crash and a subsequent red flag closed the pit entry and exit just before the Corvette could make it into pitlane, which meant Tandy had to stop for a five-second emergency service for fuel.

Not only did that cost Corvette Racing a shot at the lead, it also meant a loss of more than a lap of track position. Due to the sporting regulations, Tandy wasn't allowed to leave the pitlane until the field made a full lap past the pit exit after race officials lifted the red flag. Ouch!

Continuing rain delays and caution flags prevented our car from getting back into the lead lap.

Meeting your Vice President Art Donnelly

Well, visitors are gone; travels over at least for awhile, so now perhaps I can actually focus on being your National Corvette Museum ambassador and talk about Museum things. Speaking of which, please find in the following paragraphs words about Hot Wheels display, benefits of Museum membership and, I hope, useful information on automobile bra installation on the C8 generation.

Hot Wheels Display

Mattel has been making Hot Wheels vehicles since 1968 producing 800 models and 11,000 variations and selling four billion (with a "B"). The Hot Wheels display opened May 27th and will run until September 25, 2022. Attendees can participate in a variety of events. "This family learning experience provides hands-on opportunities for parents to explain complex physics concepts in fun ways utilizing the popular Hot Wheels toy cars as they experiment with different principles to see which makes a car go fastest," said Jennifer Pace Robinson, president and CEO of the museum that produced the exhibit: The Children's Museum of Indianapolis.

"Children and families will love the Pit Stop Challenge in which they can race the clock – and their family and



friends – to change tires and refuel cars. A 6-lane downhill speed track, booster power track, adjustable angles track, and timing track are just a few of the ways visitors will be able to test their theories regarding the science of racing and cause and effect. Real race car parts, authentic artifacts, and captivating memorabilia including Corvettes from the National Corvette Museum's collection will round out the experience" according to the Museum web site.

This should make a museum visit more enjoyable for younger family members and give parents a little respite from what might be a boring visit for the youngsters.

Museum Membership: What's in it for me?

This is a frequent and very valid question. The National Corvette Museum is a 9.5 hour, 708 mile drive away and that is based on doing exactly the speed limit with no hinderances such as pesky traffic lights or traffic jams. So, that makes the free museum entry benefit a bit questionable unless, like Brooke and I, one makes multiple trips to the Museum per year. What we have found is that the most useful benefit is the 10% discount Museum members get on merchandise from the store. But, let's talk about the 10% discount on merchandise: our experience is that it doesn't take many purchases to reach the \$650 amount resulting in \$65 discount paying for the individual membership. A relatively quick search of the on-line Corvette store revealed a C6 or C7 or Supercharged ZR1 Corvette Lambskin Leather Bomber Jacket for \$339. Add the Corvette Zip Top Black Leather Shopper's purse for \$288 and you not only have some pretty nice gifts but the discount pays for your individual membership. By the way, the \$65 individual membership price takes effect June 15th. Up till then, it's \$50 so act quickly. You can find membership application forms on the National Corvette Museum web site.



C8 Corvette Bra: "If At First You Don't Succeed" or "Its All About The Shot Glass!"

One of my best purchases at the at Corvette Museum Store during one of my 4 Bowling Green visits over the last year, was the purchase of the museum-recommended car bra. It was a great buy for about \$150.

So why did I buy TWO bras the last year?

Well, let's try the first purchase to begin with. We took delivery of our 2021 C8 at the Corvette Museum on May 8, 2021 along with several other delighted purchasers one of whom was driving from Bowling Green to Texas. He asked if we were buying the bra and advised we should in order to protect the front of the car and the radiators from errant stones and debris. We purchased the Novistretch bra for \$150 and paid an additional \$15 for it to be installed at the Museum.

All was good, or so we thought. Leaving the Museum, we soon realized that our Novistretch bra covered our HD/ Front and Rear Camera system --- or, at least the front camera which now provided a high-definition image of the back of the bra.



"It's All About the Shot Glass!" Once at home, I tried to cut holes for the cameras. The first bra I tried unsuccessfully to cut "exact" circles around the front cameras. I wish I could show you the video. Bottom line: not good. It was time to reevaluate my hole cutting technique. Enter the shot glass! I purchased the second bra on a subsequent trip to the museum and vowed to do a better job with this one. I installed the new bra on the car and got a shot glass from the bar to use as a guide. I placed the shot glass on the bra over each of the cameras and used a Sharpie to outline the top of the shot glass. I removed the bra and stretched it over the shot glass so the Sharpie circle was on

the rim. It is stretch fabric so you must stretch it back to the installed size in order to fit. The final, and important thing, was to singe the Sharpie markings to create a finished, perfect circle. IT WORKED!

The car with the unique bra technique was not exactly the "hit" of the last day of this year's Bash, but it did draw attention. How did you do that? Answer? With a shot glass, a Sharpie, and a product from Hot Wire Foam Factory that the container says: "cuts polystyrene foam like a knife through butter."

Moral of my story: Some things are so simple the second time around.

Non-Z51 Corvette Stingray Units Under Constraint

New Chevy Corvette C8 Stingray owners eager to get the most from their mid-engine sports car are encouraged to opt for the Z51 Performance Package, which adds in a host of go-faster bits that take the C8 Stingray to even-greater levels of performance. Critically, the package may speed up delivery as well, as GM Authority has learned that non-Z51 Corvette Stingray units are currently under constraint.



According to GM Authority sources, units of the Chevy Corvette C8 Stingray not equipped with the Z51 package are currently under constraint due to a supply issue with the Mechanical limited-slip differential (RPO code G0J). The constraint applies to both 2022- and 2023-modelyear vehicles.



As a reminder, the Z51 Performance Package includes an Electronic Limited Slip Differential (eLSD, RPO code G96), which replaces the Mechanical limited-slip differential equipped by non-Z51 Corvette C8 Stingray units. The Electronic limited-slip differential is available and only included with the Z51 Performance Package, the latter of which is offered as an optional extra for all three C8 Stingray trim levels. As it stands, non-Z51 orders are currently limited to 375 units a week.

For those who may be unaware, the eLSD differs from the Mechanical LSD in a few crucial ways. Essentially, while the latter unit uses mechanical factors to control the clutch and locking force between the right and left wheels, an eLSD uses the onboard computer to control

the lock-up between the two rear wheels via a bevy of data and other inputs, such as tire temperature. The electronic unit allows for a greater range of tuning and control for more confidence-inspiring feedback between the car and the driver, thus encouraging faster and faster lap times.



As a reminder, the Corvette C8 Stingray is equipped with the naturally aspirated 6.2L V8 LT2 gasoline engine just behind the cabin, which is rated at 490 horsepower and 465 pound-feet of torque. Under the body panels, the C8 rides on the GM Y2 platform, while production takes place at the GM Bowling Green plant in Kentucky.

Don "The Snake" Prudhomme: Still racing at 81

SIX-TIME NHRA champion Don Prudhomme made a living piloting eye-catching race cars down the guarter-mile. Early in his career he drove the Hawaiian rail for the Leone family, and in the '70s, he campaigned an Army-sponsored Chevy Monza. But his greatest fame came when he teamed up with Tom "Mongoose" McEwen, and they match-raced their funny cars—the "Mongoose" Duster and the "Snake" Barracuda—in the late-'60s. The pairing caught the attention of Mattel, leading to premium sponsorship for both cars, a line of Hot Wheels toys, and eventually a feature film titled "Snake & Mongoose." McEwen died in 2018 at the age of 81.

Prudhomme turned 81 last month, as he prepped for a 1000-mile off-road down the Baja California peninsula. Just last year, after his class victory in the NORRA 1000, called it quits on off-road racing. "Yep, I said that," Prudhomme recalls. "But Baja is just a place that keeps calling me back to try it one more time. I think we can win it again.

"I'm just ready to go—I'm 81 years old, but I still feel like I'm 51." Aside from a sciatic nerve in his back that keeps acting up, Prudhomme says he's in amazingly good shape. "I've been blessed. And I just got a cortisone shot for the sciatica, so my back should be good to go."

Prudhomme and racer Dick Firestone (yes, from the tire family) will be racing the retired drag racer's modified Can-Am UTV once again. "We've done some work on it, and it should be a little faster," Prudhomme says of his wicked-looking side-by-side. In fact, when we spoke to the Snake—a nickname he earned in high school growing up in Southern California—he was taking the shocks from the Can-Am to veteran off-road racer and tuner Walker Evans for some last-minute tweaks. Apparently, it's a star-studded affair, as P.J. Jones, son of racing legend Parnelli Jones, will be helping out, too. "We're serious about it," Prudhomme says. "If we weren't, we'd have no business heading down there."



The 1000-mile scramble is sanctioned by the National Off Road Racing Association (NORRA). The first NORRA Mexican 1000 ran in 1967, and eventually transitioned into what we know known as the Baja 1000. The NORRA 1000 is a little more low-key than the , with five days allowed to cover the 1000 miles.

Each year, the route is different, and unlike the Baja 1000, you can't pre-run this race. You don't get the chip containing the route for your GPS until the day before the race. Drivers have less than 24 hours to study the downloaded map before they careen off into the dessert. "It's tough," Prudhomme says. "Some days we'll do 250 miles, some days 150, but we'll average 200 miles over the five days."



The race starts Monday, May 2, and runs through the following Friday. (It is live-streamed at) The field is comprised of restored vintage race cars, historic vehicles, as well as modern-day, high-tech race cars, trucks, and motorcycles as they traverse the challenging and spectacular landscape of Baja, Mexico.

"I like going fast," Prudhomme says. "I don't go crazy fast anymore, I just go fast."

Prudhomme went crazy fast for years. As a teenager, he joined a Southern California car club called the Road Kings of Burbank. "They had a dragster that they took to a track near where I lived, and I got to drive it. I was hooked. Absolutely hooked."


Prudhomme won his first national event in 1965. (If you have Roku on your television, there's a 24-hour NHRA drag racing channel, and they've been airing vintage black-and-white coverage of the first win for Prudhomme and his rail dragster.) Not long after, he moved to full-bodied Funny Cars. The Snake is one of the few drivers who have won titles in the NHRA's Top Fuel and Funny Car classes.







According to veteran Prudhomme, the dragsters are easier to drive, but he preferred Funny Cars, and won four titles in the fiberglass floppers. "They're a little trickier, but they are the most exciting to drive," he says. He was also the first Funny Car driver to top 250 mph. Prudhomme eventually retired from driving in 1994 but continued to own winning race teams.



As for drag racing today, "I wish I had a lot of good things to say. It costs so damn much money to be in it professionally," says "the Snake." To race, you have to bring a lot of sponsorship, or your folks supply the money, or you marry into it, or something. The cost has run a lot of the good people out. But that's the way it is with all professional racing. It's all about money."

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"I'm glad I came up when I did. It was the golden years, really – the building of the sport, the innovation, the ability to do new things. I'm so glad I raced when I did," says Prudhomme.

He added: "And I'm happy to be doing what I'm doing now."

Ralph R. Teetor: Blind Automotive Engineer

Learn about the man who invented cruise control and so much more...

In many lists of little-known automotive historical facts is often included a tidbit about the engineer who invented cruise control was actually blind. Yeah, that seems pretty incredible, but that's where the info about Ralph R. Teetor begins and ends for most. That's sad, because the life Teetor lived was inspirational and rich as he left an indelible mark on the automotive industry which extended far beyond just the creation of cruise control.


Teetor wasn't born blind. Instead, he spent part of his childhood in Victorian rural Indiana with the full use of all his senses. However, an accident with a knife at the age of five left him completely blind. His deeply religious parents didn't allow Ralph to feel sorry for himself, an attitude he adopted himself. Pulling himself up by his bootstraps, the boy learned to do what everyone else who could see did, including driving a car and attending college. There was no shortage of doubters, although they were quickly won over once they saw Teetor in action.




From a young age, Ralph had an intense interest in the work his father and uncles performed as they created maintenance cars for the railroad lines. He learned to work lathes, grinders, and other dangerous machines in the shop without serious injury. In fact, after a while many of the men remarked how the blind boy was more proficient with their tools of trade than them.

Ralph further proved his wherewithal in college, which he completed with the help of a cousin. However, life took him back to the family business, which had transitioned to making components for automobiles. Because the business started to focus mainly on piston rings, the name was changed to Perfect Circle, a brand you might recognize.

Just by listening to an engine, Ralph Teetor could correctly diagnose a mechanical problem. He was famous for this, resulting in his working with a number of people in the automotive industry to diagnose issues, including motorsports teams. You could say he was a car whisperer of sorts.





Of course, Ralph Teetor's most famous contribution to the automotive industry was the invention of cruise control. It was the fuel and tire rationing during WWII which was enforced by a national speed limit of 35 mph that originally got him thinking of how to help people maintain a constant speed over long distances. In the early days, the "Speedostat" (Ralph hated the name "cruise control" as suggested by Cadillac later) featured a dashboard-mounted speed selector. Once the vehicle achieved the selected speed, a governor overcame spring tension to actuate a vacuum-driven piston, which in turn would push against the gas pedal. The patent for this amazing invention was filed in 1945, but it wasn't until the oil crisis of the 1970s that it really caught on. With a national speed limit put in place to help conserve fuel and law enforcement vigorously enforcing it, people clamored for the device which would keep them out of trouble.

Many other patents were filed by Ralph R. Teetor, including one for a hydraulic automatic transmission, an improved piston for controlling heat expansion, a mechanism for dynamically balancing steam turbines in US Navy ships, a pistol-grip fishing pole handle, an easier-to-use doorknob, a better lawn mower, an easier-to-use door lock, and a suitcase which fit more clothes without wrinkling them. His daughter testified he was always tinkering in the basement at night, with the lights off, as his mind worked on all kinds of problems. The man had an unceasing desire to improve the quality of life for everyone around him, which he did.

Throughout his life, Ralph Teetor counseled many other blind people, including war veterans who lost their site in service to their country. He always told them to not feel sorry for themselves and to work smart as well as hard, that in so doing they could accomplish great things in their life. The man absolutely practiced what he preached as he didn't let his lack of sight hold in back in the least.

Joe Striano, with Card Access will duplicate your gate card and apply a small patch on the inside of your driver's side mirror. You will then be able to pull up to a gate and it will automatically open. The installation is simple and quick. (About 5 minutes) No disassembly or alterations are required.
