THERE IS A NEW C8 IN TOWN



I have driven my 2020 Torch Red Corvette approximately 130 miles (almost all within The Villages) since taking delivery on Thursday, March 19th. Following are some of my initial observations formulated during this short driving time:

- The car is extremely quiet. I literally can not hear any engine noise even with the radio off.
- Driving around the roundabouts is effortless. The car has excellent cornering characteristics.
- Most of my driving has been on "Tour" mode. However, I prefer a loud exhaust sound that is not programmed into this driving mode. Using the "My Mode" setting, which allows for engine sound, steering, suspension and braking responses to be customized, I programmed all settings as "Tour" except for the

engine (exhaust) sound which I programmed as "Sport". It accomplished my objective! Note – I can only faintly hear the loud exhaust sound when driving with the windows closed.

- I have been using the rear-view camera mode which allows for excellent rear view visibility.
- Transmission shifting is barely noticeable and extremely quick. In approaching a stop light from approximately 35MPH, the transmission automatically downshifts 3 to 4 times as speed is being reduced, resulting in barely any need to apply the brake.
- MPG is ranging from 15 to 17 while driving in The Villages.
- Learning all of the options for the Driver Information Center and the Infotainment Screen is still a "work-in-process". Lots of options!
- I just loaded a 64GB SD card into the Performance Data Recorder. I am planning on using it as a built-in Dashcam.
- The Front Lift System works great! I have stored the location of our driveway and the car automatically lifts 2" when I am approximately 50' from the driveway. No more scraping the front end of the car!
- Ingress and egress is much easier compared to previous generation Corvettes.
- The car is a Z51 with the 3LT package that includes a custom interior trim and seat combination package
 consisting of an Adrenaline Red lower dash and trim, Jet Black seats with red stitching and red seat belts. It sure
 looks great!
- Finally, I sure get a lot of looks! The C8 certainly attracts a lot of attention.





VILLAGE 'VETTES CLUB HOSTED THE NATIONAL CORVETTE MUSEUM REPRESENTATIVE



The Village 'Vettes Corvette Club was honored to host Derek Moore, NCM director of Collections & Museum Curator, at its March 12, 2020 meeting. Derek is a member of the museum's leadership team, and functions practically as the museum's chief operating officer. Derek has been with NCM for 2-1/2 years, and formerly was employed at the Crawford aviation museum and Henry Ford Museum.

Derek gave our club an hour long slide show, and fielded questions throughout, on his areas of responsibility at NCM – which are broad, far reaching and "behind the scenes" including documenting, restoring, preserving, managing and storing artifacts; acquisition and removal of artifacts; maintenance of the library; certification of the museum; and museum exhibits.

Recent developments at the museum include acquisition of the F.O.P. building on the south end of the property for storage of small and medium artifacts, as well as housing a video recording studio; expansion of the self building where the museum's 130-140 owned, loaner, and gm cars are stored along with old assembly line equipment; ongoing work on 5 museum accreditation applications; acquisition of an entombed 1954 Corvette; acquisition of an GM experimental 2 rotor Corvette; and working with gm to restore the original 2 rotor engine to be put back into the car.

Likewise, many projects are underway and planned for the museum exhibit area. Examples of these are rebuilding of the performance gallery which will house 11 vehicles and be designed as an interactive exhibit with kiosks; the big daddy Roth artist exhibit and exhibition of Ed Roth vehicles; the Damsell's of design exhibit; the 60 years of mid-engine corvette design exhibit; the fully vetted video series on the NCM website; and the Vette Academy video series which member George Borke recently announced via a member email.

Lastly, the NCM has recently started exhibition of vehicles at select car shows and competitions, as well as loaned a Corvette to the National Air & Space Museum in Washington dc for a one-year exhibition.

At the conclusion of Derek's remarks, he was presented with an official Village 'Vettes club shirt and ball cap as a showing of our appreciation. Thanks to all those Village 'Vettes members who attended the March 12, 2020 meeting!

CONVERTIBLE TOP CARE

For our members that have a Rag Top, here are a few tips for care that I have researched from the Corvette Owner's Manual and Haartz Corporation, the company that makes the fabric for the convertible tops.

First: Wash with a good quality car wash. I like Griot's, Mother's, and McGuire's. DO NOT USE DISH DETERGENT.

Between washings, I use a lint roller or vacuum cleaner to clean dust and dirt. If you get a bird dropping on your top, and you have a hose with nozzle available, rinse it off immediately, otherwise, wait till it dries, then vacuum to remove. Do not try to rub off with a towel if moist, it will just make it worse.

General Motors does not recommend a <u>CAR WASH</u> for convertible tops. Haartz recommends Ragg Topp products that are available from Autogeek.com, Corvette Museum, Zips, and other Corvette vendors.

Stubborn soiled spots or the entire top can be cleaned with Ragg Topp Cleaner and a soft brush.

After the top has dried, apply Ragg Topp Protectant as directed. I apply it in the garage, and I always cover the entire car with a plastic drop cover when applying the protectant.

When the car is in the garage or parked in the driveway/street, keep the top up to protect the interior from the sun. Leaving the top up when in the garage will also avoid the top from getting wrinkles in the fabric.

The One Thing You Need to Become a Race Car Driver

Luck and money are helpful, but they won't get you there. You have to want it more than anything.

"I've always wanted to be a race-car driver."

I've heard this comment more times than I've raced a car myself, usually from the person sitting next to me on a plane, after they find out what I do for a living. And each time, the first thing through my mind is, "No you haven't." (I don't actually say that—I try to be polite.) See, if they really did want to be a racer, they would have become one. But they didn't want it bad enough. To race, at any level, requires sacrifice and commitment.

This story originally appeared in the February 2020 issue of Road & Track.

A friend recently commented that he could have been a good club racer, but didn't want it bad enough. Let's hear it for honesty!

Racing is more accessible than many sports. If you're five-eight and 150 pounds, I don't care how badly you want to play in the NFL, you're probably not going to make it. But almost anyone can physically drive a race car. What separates those who make it from those who don't? Desire. Commitment. Discipline. Sacrifice. Hard work. In another word: want.

This year we've had two major motion pictures featuring auto racing: The Art of Racing in the Rain and Ford v Ferrari. There's one common theme: Denny Swift and Carroll Shelby wanted in, and badly. Driver or team owner, they each sacrificed a lot. And it's the same in real life. People say it just takes money. If so, why are there so many drivers at the very top who made it without a silver spoon? Lewis Hamilton didn't come from a wealthy family. Neither did Scott Dixon.

At one time, I had a "real" job. My day gig now involves race cars and a lot of interesting travel. It's hard work, but it's different. My old job was a means to an end, a way to pay for what I really wanted. I'd heard of a woman from a wealthy family who sponsored some drivers in the Formula Atlantic series, so I knew I needed to meet her. I jumped in my car on a Friday after work and drove 13 hours to Sonoma Raceway (it was called Sears Point back then), arriving early on Saturday morning. After freshening up as much as I could, I searched the paddock for my target and found her just after noon.

My initial contact was rewarded with an invite to sit down the following morning to talk. I positioned my car in the back corner of the parking lot, so I could sleep that night in as much comfort as possible. After a 20-minute conversation the next morning that ultimately led nowhere (but did fuel some of my hopes), I watched the Formula Atlantic race (the one I wanted to be in).

Then I drove 13 hours north so I could shower and get back to work on Monday morning.

While this was far from the biggest sacrifice I made in my career, I don't know of a driver who doesn't have dozens of stories like it. Homes, marriages, careers, and bank accounts are common sacrifices. This magazine's

editor at large, Sam Smith, recently told me that, when he was younger, he sold his couch to pay for more race tires. Sleeping and sitting on furniture are low priorities in a racer's life.

The best drivers at all levels have one common trait: They're a cross between stupidly optimistic and actively pessimistic. It's the stupid optimism that triggers the commitment, and the active pessimism that gets them off the couch and doing what it takes—honing their craft on a daily basis, whether in the car or at the gym, preparing mentally, understanding technical nuance, or working the sport's business end. As with any great craftsman, the product is never quite good enough. That last lap could have been even better, I could train just a little harder, I could commit just a bit more, I'm never quite satisfied.

If you're unwilling to do what it takes to reach glory, that's fine. There's nothing wrong with admitting it. But don't fool yourself into thinking you can chase a dream without commitment.

Whether you want to be a pro driver or simply drive your car at a track day, don't just say you want it. Do it. A bonus? When we run into each other on a plane some day, the conversation will be that much more fun.

Corvette Museum Launches Educational Video Series For Chevy Fans Stuck At Home



The National Corvette Museum has launched a new online educational video series to help keep Chevrolet fans informed and entertained while at home during the coronavirus pandemic.

The free video series, dubbed Vetteacademy, will offer educational, Corvette-related content for all ages. A new video will be released each weekday via the Corvette Museum's Facebook page and YouTube channel, providing a consistent stream of content for those who have been banished to their living rooms.

So far, topics for Vetteacamedy episodes have included Corvette Generations, the Museum's Sinkhole and MEchanics: How to Change a Tire. The series is geared toward school-aged children, providing basic background info on a variety of subjects, but adults are also encouraged to tune in to the videos as well.

"Many museums across the country are offering free virtual content to stay engaged with their audience while attracting new fans," said Dr. Sean Preston, President and CEO of the Corvette Museum. "As a nonprofit foundation, our mission is to educate the public. We developed these videos to not only provide educational content, but also be entertaining and engaging."

For those adults who want a more intensive deep dive into the history of the Corvette and the National Corvette Museum, the organization has also launched an adjacent series called Fully Vetted. Debuting on Tuesday, the videos will feature Museum Director of Collections and Curator Derek E. Moore and Museum Historical Media Coordinator Bob Bubnis, who will work to "decode Corvette history," for viewers and provide an in-depth look at the origins of the iconic sports coupe.

The Corvette Museum had originally planned to launch Fully Vetted as a paid series online to support its usual revenue streams from museum admission, but with the coronavirus pandemic keeping folks at home for the coming weeks or even months, it wanted to give Chevy fans a fun way to pass the time.

"Our Fully Vetted series is designed to provide a digital touch-point to Corvette fans worldwide while also offering educational and entertaining content for those wanting to soak up as much Corvette information as possible," added Preston. "Derek and Bob will share in-depth stories, the lore behind the brand, and a behind-the-scenes view of America's Sports Car."

Preston also said the museum is welcoming "tax-deductible donations to help us continue providing educational content through these challenging times." The museum remains closed amid the pandemic and it is currently not clear when it will be able to reopen.

With spring car shows, races, and other automotive events having been cancelled or rescheduled, the National Corvette Museum has pulled together resources to offer then next best thing – an online car show.

"Being a 501c3 nonprofit foundation we started brainstorming ways to keep our audience engaged and the idea of an online car show emerged," said Dr. Sean Preston, President and CEO of the Museum. "We've created a number of categories that people can enter including the opportunity to share a little extra about their car – so rather than have judging like a typical car show, it's fun, celebrity choice awards."

Corvette elite through the generations were quick to jump on board with the idea. Joining the line-up of celebrity judges include retired Engineers and Chief Engineers Gib Hufstader, Dave McLellan, Dave Hill and Tom Wallace, Designers Peter Brock, Jerry Palmer and Tom Peters, racers Tony DeLorenzo,

John Heinricy, Andy Pilgrim and Johnny O'Connell as well as Racing Program Manager Doug Fehan, past and present GM Corvette Plant Managers Kai Spande, Jeff Lamarche, Dave Tatman, Wil Cooksey and Paul Schnoes, Corvette Hall of Fame inductees Reeves Callaway and Mike Yager, Corvettes at Carlisle's Lance Miller, and Museum President Sean Preston.

A total of 24 awards will be given, including for each Corvette Generation, Corvette Race Cars, Best Story, Most Unique/Personalized, Plant Manager's Choice, President's Choice, People's Choice and a Club Participation Award to the Corvette Club with the highest percentage of participation. For the C8 award, Ralph White has donated two Next Generation Corvette Counter Stools with backs. Honorable mention certificates will also be awarded.

"We wanted to encourage all enthusiasts to enter, even if they don't normally enter their car in shows. We created categories that give everyone a fair shot at walking away with some recognition," shared Sean. "One category focuses

solely on the story behind the car and we can't wait to read the submissions!"

Corvette enthusiasts can enter the show on the Museum's website (corvettemuseum.org) from April 6 - 12. The cost to enter is \$10 per car, with the option to add on additional judged categories for \$10 each. Enthusiasts can enter more than one Corvette by using a separate online entry form per car. Each household that enters will receive a commemorative dash plaque.

All entries will be posted on the Museum's website, and judging will occur the week of April 12. The Museum will post a video announcing the winners on Thursday, April 23. Awards will be mailed to each winner or can be held for pickup at the Michelin NCM Bash, slated for May 28-30.

"During these uncertain times the Museum has worked hard to keep as many of our staff employed as possible. The car show is not only a fun way for people to get involved in the car hobby at a 'social distance' but will hopefully generate a little revenue for the Museum while we are closed. We are excited for everyone to fill our website's pages with images on their beautiful Corvettes!" added Sean.


