Our flight out there was long. Approximately five hours with masks on. Upon arrival to the driving school, we checked in. Everyone was extremely cordial and answered all our questions.

We had opted to spend our night before the classes to stay at the condos. The condos were excellent. Everything we needed was there. It was neat and clean. I certainly looked forward to our first day of class and driving but was unsure what was to be expected of me

From the get-go the instructors were tremendously helpful, friendly, and certainly knowledgeable in all the topics that we were discussing. We had multiple instructors depending on which class we attended.

After some informative instruction, we were able to pick our cars and do some driving. The first day of driving included what they call "lead follow" where we follow the instructor around the course using the techniques that they showed us in class. Not at very high speeds just to get familiar with the course.

We then did some "auto cross" that day to feel out the track and get ready for the competition on day two.

We learned about our ABS system and did braking on the skid pad. Our instructor made this exercise very interesting because he would stand at the end and once we applied the brakes, we had to go left or right depending on his instruction. Once you put on traction control and also put it in weather mode you could not purposely spin out. That's how good the computers on these cars are.

We also did a ride along with the instructor. He showed us how it should be done.. It was a thrill. Only 1 person threw up.

CORVETTE RACING 24 Hours at Daytona by Ron Cullum

No Win Situation - they did not win

Both Chevrolet Corvette C8.R GTDs ended up in the shop in a major blow to the Chevrolet factory team's efforts to claim a second consecutive Rolex 24 at Daytona class win. But there was much more to the story than that.

In prior years the Corvettes ran in the GT Leman's (GTLM) class, but that was discontinued at the end of last season. So, Corvette was faced with the decision of whether to drop racing all together, or to

significantly modify the car to run with GT3 cars. The problem is that converting the Corvette from a GTLM car to a GT3 car is not an insignificant task and would a lot of time to completely build a new car. So, what has happened is that IMSA (the racing gurus and the other teams) agreed to let Corvette run in a "non-standard" car for a year with some modifications (i.e. different tires, less power, different wings for down force and modified weight among other things). Bottom line is that Corvette can compete in the GTD PRO class this year while Chevy creates a true GT3 car.

But here is the no-win scenario. With all the modifications the Corvette just isn't as competitive. In fact, their fastest lap was nearly 1 second slower that everyone who made the podium. But, had they won, everyone would have said that being a modified GT3 car, they had an unfair advantage. Truly a "no-win" situation.

But back to the race. In the first nine hours both cars were doing OK, at least flirting with a top 5 finish (there were 13 cars in the class). But then the alternator went out on the #3 car, which caused them to lose at least 3 laps (but wouldn't you like your service people to be able to replace an alternator in under 10 minutes?).

The #4 car was not as fortunate. In the middle of the night while slowing down for a car that had spun out, Marco Sorenson got hit from behind by a Porsche (which ultimately won the race). At first the damage didn't appear too bad, but upon being checked at the pits, it turned out to be extensive and cost about 13 laps.

At the end, both cars did finish, #3 in sixth place and #4 in 10 place. Given everything that happened, probably not a bad showing for a first time out.

Hopefully as the season moves on, IMSA will work out a better BoP (Balance of Power) formula that will at least let the Corvette have a shot at the podium. But don't expect a repeat of last year when Corvette ran away with everything.

If your planing on Visting the Corvette Factory or Museum in Bowling Green Ky, you may want to read and save this article

Over 95% of the world's bourbon comes from nearly 70 distilleries in Kentucky's Bourbon Country. All of

the big bourbon names are here — Jim Beam, Woodford Reserve, Maker's Mark, and Wild Turkey, among others — and there's good reason for that. Kentucky's natural environment and weather are perfect for bourbon distilling, so when European immigrants (who knew how to distill spirits) settled in Kentucky in the 1700s, it was a match made in whiskey heaven. Now, hundreds of years later, people can visit the state to experience the top Kentucky distilleries — several of which have been crafting spirits for generations — along the Kentucky Bourbon Trail, a route with over 37 distilleries offering tastings and tours.

Kentucky distillery tours, tastings, and experiences show visitors how spirits are made, so you'll walk away with some knowledge, a more refined palate, and probably a few bottles to take home. Those looking for a well-rounded whiskey experience should start their journey at the Kentucky Bourbon Trail Welcome Center in Louisville. Here, visitors can learn more about bourbon history and plot their distillery stops (if you don't already know which ones you want to visit). Make Louisville your home base for a multiday trip along the trail — the city is home to its own Urban Bourbon Trail made up of the best bourbon bars around. The bars on this route have to serve at least 50 kinds of bourbon and host a bourbon event every month, so you're sure to leave Kentucky with a new appreciation for the brown spirit.

Here are 12 Kentucky distilleries all bourbon fans should visit — and don't worry, some even offer gin or vodka for those hoping for a little variety in their tastings.

Tour and tasting offerings, along with distillery hours of operation, may change due to the coronavirus pandemic, so be sure to check ahead before you plan your trip. Currently, experiences are limited and many tours have been postponed until further notice, but visitors can still buy bottles or even enjoy tastings at several of these distilleries.

Wild Turkey, Lawrenceburg

With an award-winning visitor center, a tasting room with an incredible view of the Kentucky River, and a gift shop selling souvenirs and Wild Turkey bourbon (of course), this is the perfect place to learn how this brand's popular spirits are made. You might even spot Hall of Fame distillers Jimmy and Eddie Russell hard at work.



Bulleit Distilling Co., Shelbyville

Bulleit Distilling Co. opened its state-of-the-art distillery to visitors in 2019. It's a relatively new addition to the Kentucky distillery scene, but the bourbon is based in family tradition dating back to the 1800s. Taste your way through the brand's whiskeys and learn about its history during an interactive, multisensory experience.



Jim Beam, Clermont

With one of the most recognizable names in Kentucky bourbon, Jim Beam is a must-experience for many visitors. Take a tour of the brand's birthplace in Clermont — the Jim Beam American Stillhouse is set to reopen in spring 2021 with an improved visitor experience.



Maker's Mark Distillery, Loretto

Another iconic bourbon brand known for its red wax-dipped bottles, the Maker's Mark Distillery in Loretto offers tours of the National Historic Landmark, so guests can learn about the history of the brand and its makers. Visitors can even hand-dip their own bottle in the classic red wax for a fitting souvenir.



Woodford Reserve Distillery, Versailles

Visit Woodford Reserve's historic distillery in Versailles for tours and tastings, so you can learn more about the creation of this brand's bourbon. The distillery is actually a National Historic Landmark — according to Woodford Reserve, the "art of making fine bourbon first took place on the site" in 1812.

Buffalo Trace Distillery in Kentucky

Buffalo Trace Distillery, Frankfort

This family-owned distillery has traditions dating back to the late 1700s, and it's a National Historic Landmark and listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Take a tour to learn more about the fascinating history of bourbon production, and taste their spirits — the distillery produces bourbon, rye, and vodka.



Four Roses Distillery, Lawrenceburg

Take a tour or enjoy a guided tasting at this Lawrenceburg distillery. This unique Spanish Mission-style distillery was built in 1910, and it's also listed on the National Register of Historic Places, so you can enjoy a history lesson while learning about Four Roses' unique recipes.



Angel's Envy Distillery, Louisville

Located on Louisville's Whiskey Row, this distillery offers unique tours and tasting experiences, including a Bottle Your Own Tour, which gives visitors the chance to bring home a bottle that they filled themselves.

Castle & Key Distillery, Frankfort

Bardstown Bourbon Company, Bardstown

This innovative distillery, located in a small town south of Louisville, has several interesting experiences, ranging from immersive tastings to classic cocktail classes. There's even an on-site restaurant with craft cocktails and gourmet eats.



Green River Distilling Co., Owensboro

Learn how whiskey goes from grain to barrel and taste the spirits with the experts at Green River Distilling Co. in Owensboro. After your tour, grab a drink at the cocktail lounge.



Heaven Hill Distillery, Bardstown

Founded in 1935, Heaven Hill Distillery maintains more than 1.6 million barrels aging in 58 warehouses in Kentucky for a portfolio of brands. Go for a tour for a behind-the-scenes look at the whiskey production, or enjoy a tasting at the Bourbon Heritage Center.

I spoke last time of conversations with Greg Waldron, the Motorsports Park Executive Director during which he speculated about the impact of the Z06 on the track. He said he expected the "Corvette Experience" at the Motorsports Park would use two tiers: one for "basic" C8s and the

Running the Track: The Motorsports Park "Corvette Experience"

Yes, you can still do the "Corvette Experience" at the Motorsports Park despite the tornado damage. They had two out of eight C8s survive the tornado, see last month's newsletter for more information, so reservations well ahead are crucial. Once there you will have three sessions each one with a classroom presentation then on to the track. You will be provided helmet socks and helmets. Best to make sure they fit and don't fall over your eyes --- you will need them. Each track session is a lead follow format with no passing allowed. The best position is immediately behind the instructor and your position will be alternated between sessions. Probably best to wait till session two or three to get immediately behind the instructor since those will be your fastest sessions. The track was full open when my wife and I visited a few weeks ago. It is 3.5 miles long with 23 turns. There are two straights: front of about half a mile and a shorter one in the back of the track. The start/finish line is near the end of the front straight --- very near. Use session one to learn the track and the instructor's key movements. Sessions two and three will be faster and you get to use more, but not all, of the C8's capabilities. They will set the modes for you and request you do not change them. Among those, they will put the transmission in automatic and ask you not to change to manual mode. Each session will include three to four laps of the track and you should start learning key points for braking, acceleration, turns, etc. You can purchase the data card from the Performance Data Recorder at the end of the class. As you review it, you will be amazed at the actual lower speeds in the corners since you will believe you were literally flying through them. The front straight is the best opportunity to reach your, not the car's, maximum speed. You will come out of the right hand turn 23 onto the straight and it is pedal to the metal. The earth goes by a bit faster with every second and then you are at the start/finish line. Hard, and I mean HARD, on the brakes because turn one is not far from the line. I learned, by session three, that the best approach to reach maximum speed is to get on the gas at or slightly before the apex on turn 23 obviously avoiding the temptation to pass either the student in front of you or the instructor. During my class and a second Corvette track session weeks later, I noted the instructors were not in Corvette C8s but in earlier generation 'Vettes or even four-cylinder Camaros. My approach then was to follow the instructor's line, braking points, acceleration points, etc. Since I knew I was in the far more capable C8, I felt that anything they do I could do better and just rely on the car. I think it worked.

Our companions, my wife Brooke in my case, were allowed to sit in on the classes and observe from the Holly tower during the track sessions. The Holly tower was severely damaged by the tornedo and I would not expect it to be operational again for quite some time. Ask about what you companion can do when you make your reservations.

A box lunch is provided at the end of the session, it is only three hours long. A very typical box lunch but now a new café is open in the Museum nearby. So, today, I would forgo the box lunch and drive to the museum café. That's it. Hope you get a chance to go and have a great "Corvette Experience" at the Motorsports Park. I did not regret it and highly recommend the experience.
